Health Priorities in Australia Summaries

2.3 A growing and ageing population:

- Healthy ageing
- Increased population living with chronic disease and disability
- Demand for health services and workforce shortages
- Availability of carers and volunteers
- Life expectancy in Australia is continually increasing
- <u>Australia's population is growing and ageing.</u> The ageing population is the consequence of sustained low fertility levels and increased life expectancy at birth
- With our ageing population, come numerous health challenges to our community. An increase in people living with chronic diseases and disabilities, places a higher demand for health services and workforce shortages, as well as the financial strain to provide these services
- Government priority is to encourage healthy ageing so as to enable people to contribute for as long as possible and to reduce the burden on our health care system
- It is projected that there will be little growth in the number of available carers, compared with the anticipated rise in demand for home-based support, which is likely to result in a shortage of carers in the future
- Better training regarding specific needs for all areas of health care and support are needed

Healthy Ageing:

- <u>Healthy ageing</u> describes the ongoing activities and behaviours an individual undertakes to reduce the risk of illness and disease and increase their physical, emotion and mental health
- <u>Healthy ageing</u> is concerned with the quality of life, not just the years of life, enjoyed by an individual
- <u>Health expenditure</u> increases with age and thus, health care professional focus on health needs of the ageing population
- It is the <u>governments priority</u> to provide the ageing population with services and support depending on their needs
- The government is also responsible for promoting healthy ageing throughout life, as well as disease prevention rather than treatments

Increased Population Living with Chronic Disease & Disability:

- <u>Disability</u>; Population ageing results in increased disability prevalence because the risk of disability is greater in older age groups
- <u>Chronic Disease</u>; Prevalence of chronic disease will significantly increase with the ageing of the population. WHO predicts that by 2020, chronic disease will account for nearly 75% of all deaths in Australia
- Our ageing population has led to an increase in the number of Australians with a chronic disease or disability (prevalence of chronic disease increases with age)
- The future levels of chronic diseases could be reduced if young people control their risk factors for chronic diseases (e.g. smoking, obesity, binge drinking and physical inactivity)

Demand for Health Services & Workforce Shortages:

- Due to the increase in the amount of Australians living with a chronic disease or disability, the demand for heath and aged care services has drastically risen
- The Australian health system is complex, with many types of service providers and a variety of funding and regulatory mechanisms. Those who provide services include a range of medical practitioners, other health professionals, hospitals, clinics, and other government and non-government agencies
- The elderly also not just subject to one illness, but many as a result of the weakening of their immune system (elderly people are more prone to a more diverse range of illnesses)
- To meet the needs of Australians in relation to health services, the government has proposed these <u>initiatives;</u>
- The provision of more nurses to cater for the demand in emergency departments and other high-demand areas
- > The expansion of the roles of nurses
- > An increase in community care e.g. home-help services and meals-on-wheels
- In addition, there has been a concern that many people suffering from poor health are unable to contribute to the workforce, thus leading to general shortages of labour
- <u>The government has taken action</u> in response to this concern by improving Australia's retirement income system in the following ways;
- A means-test aged pension is available to provide income for people after retirement
- All Australian employers are required to provide compulsory superannuation cover for all eligible employees
- Voluntary, private superannuation contributions and other forms of private savings, made by employees are also encouraged

- Increase in treatment costs

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Availability of Carers & Volunteers:

- A <u>carer</u> is a person, who through family relationship or friendship, looks after an older person or someone with a disability or chronic disease
- A **volunteer** is a person who offers to perform a service for the community on a voluntary basis
- As Australia's population ages, the number of people requiring informal care, at home and in their community is expected to rise drastically, while the number of available carers and volunteers declines
- Australia's workforce consists not only of paid workers, but also carers and volunteers, who are ageing with the rest of the population
- The paid and unpaid work of older Australians is essential to a well-functioning and caring society, which ultimately enhances the quality of life for all Australians
- It is predicted that there will be a 22% decrease in the number of carers from 2001 to 2031
